n the 1986 cult movie Crocodile Dundee, Paul Hogan played an Australian bushman. He met an American journalist who took him to New York City. While there, Dundee greets everyone on the street with 'G'day mate'. Thirty-two years later are we still saying 'G'day mate'? On our morning walk, in our work place, shops, or in our communities? G'day mate is a start that we can all make in our own world to make a difference in the lives of those who are lonely, abandoned, or marginalised within our communities. Rosies may start an outreach with 'G'day mate' but we then stay on the street to listen, to laugh, to chat, to create a community for others in our small way.

he Yeronga Catholic Parish has started a Rosies outreach at the nearby Brigadoon Boarding House to put the Good News of Jesus Christ into action. Many are those who will never read the Bible but we can share the Holy Scriptures through the way we live our lives. The outreach itself is an illustration of the parable of the Good Samaritan. Many of us in the area have walked or driven past this boarding house without thought as to who might be living there. We discovered that some are struggling, away from home and familiar faces. Through this outreach the parish community is being enriched and expanded.

Pouring one's heart out

ne of the privileges, albeit scary sometimes, as a Rosies volunteer is experiencing patrons pour out their hearts. The street environment allows for boisterous interaction as well as spots for quiet conversation. Some are happy to share their story with the group, others with a single person.

Recently a volunteer relayed: "I wandered over to two guys who were a little tentative about engaging and we haltingly exchanged pleasantries for 10 minutes. They had both experienced significant trauma in recent times so I didn't push the conversation and wandered off to sit on a vacant bench. A few minutes later, another patron who I hadn't noticed sat down near me. He was desperate to extricate himself from an environment of illicit drugs and a lack of meaningful activity. Over time we discovered we have some common experiences to engage for the rest of the outreach and we shared stories of family, faith, and the various jobs we had enjoyed during our lives. While he had suffered trauma in his life, he was able to open his heart because he could feel the freedom and trust in the Rosies environment. The other two guys will hopefully experience that freedom and trust as Rosies teams turn up in the weeks and months ahead."





Conversing in Ipswich

revor regularly comes to visit the Rosies van in lpswich. He is well-known among volunteers and patrons alike as a 'stirrer' for the steady stream of jokes he shares. He has known Rosies for over 20 years. He first came to our van in Brisbane before moving to Ipswich to find more affordable rent. Years of farm work, then landscaping from the Sunshine Coast to the Gold Coast, left Trevor with a bad back, no longer able to perform manual work. In the 2011 floods, he and his wife lost everything when their house went under water. "I got back the following day (of the peak) to let the cats out. I had to swim against current to get to the house. The current was so strong I drifted metres away, but I eventually made it."

Seven years later, the house is yet to be fixed, to affect Trevor's sense of He visited Rosies in Ipswich in the wake of the floods and has been coming to the local outreach ever since. Initially it was to get some material support, but now it is really about meeting with friends. "It's nice to have something to do on a Friday night and to meet with familiar faces and have a chat."

> so like Yours, that others may feel at home with You,


so forgetful of self that we might simply become the place where You and they meet
