Of the 20,000 Queenslanders who are homeless tonight, over 40% are aged 25 or under. Of those 3,500 are aged under 12.


Education and awareness play a vital role in prevention and support.

S(HOOLIES (HILL OVT WITH ROSIES

An estimated 25,000 young people will take part in this year's Gold Coast Schoolies Week 21 November - 5 December. A big thank you to our dedicated volunteers who are manning Rosies' 'Recharge zone'.

Our Rosies team of volunteers will provide a staggering 8,000 cups of water each night as well as comfort to many participants. Hydration is especially important for the youngsters who are enjoying themselves after a long day in the sun.

Plus, many of the participants will be from outside the Coast including from regional Queensland. For some it will be their first time far from home in a crowded environment. Rosies' presence will provide comfort for some overwhelmed by the sheer numbers or the hyperactivity of the week. Conversation with a responsible

adult in a safe environment is often one of the greatest therapies.

Rosies is the longest serving community organisation supporting the Gold Coast Schoolies Community Safety Response Program. The program is a response to the week-long celebration with the aim to make it as manageable and safe as possible for school leavers and the local community. We thank all our volunteers who took part in the Safety Response, with a special mention to Vacen Taylor, our Schoolies coordinator, who also provided training for all our volunteers.

YOU MAKE A DIFFERENCE THIS FESTIVE SEASON (from cover)

Jane's husband, David, recently passed away most unexpectedly*. He was only 59 and had been struggling after having been laid off work. Jane, 58, and David had worked hard their whole lives. Raised a family. Built a home. A life. Then it was all gone. It only took missing a few loan repayments and now Jane is about to become homeless.

Unfortunately Jane's story is not unique. Tonight, 20,000 Queenslanders are homeless. Nearly half are women. As our population is ageing new trends are emerging. Older people, particularly women are increasingly becoming homeless. Many do not have sufficient superannuation to fund retirement.

Whilst some may have a roof, many do not have a secure or safe home. Often they find themselves in and out of temporary shelter, staying with family or friends, or sleeping in cars. Most are not homeless by choice. It is their only option. Often they are hidden. Many more are simply lonely. Christmas can be one of the loneliest days of the year.



'We meet plaintiffs and defendants and witnesses, families, and friends, lawyers and barristers, court staff and security officers. Everyone is equal. All can sit next to each other sharing the simple joy of a conversation while enjoying sweets and savouries. People walk in and share their stories. They feel relieved to talk through what they are going through whether it is a win, a loss, or an ongoing dispute. The room is like a little gem shining from smiles and laughs. Worries are not permitted and compassion is shared. It does not seem to be much. Yet, it makes a world of difference.'

Rosies is pleased to confirm, thanks to the support and goodwill of all involved, that our angels recently relocated to a new area within the Southport Magistrates Court to continue their wonderful work.
